#### **DID YOU KNOW...?**

- Weather forecasters suggest that Long Island is due for a severe hurricane or tropical storm in the near future.
- Nearly 2 out of every 3 households on Long Island own animals.
- During emergencies and evacuation situations, pet owners are among the most hesitant and vulnerable populations because of the fear of having to leave their pets behind.
- Most evacuation shelters are NOT petfriendly.
- Following Hurricane Katrina, a National Survey from the American Humane Association (2007) found that approximately 47% of Americans surveyed would refuse rescue assistance if they had to leave their family pet(s) behind!
- County Officials, along with the SPCA, have identified a need for pet owners in Suffolk County to make an emergency evacuation plan that includes their pets.

# It's Hurricane Season on Long Island...

In the event of a natural or manmade disaster, 'failing to plan is planning to fail'! Three simple steps can help prepare you and ALL of your loved ones in the event of a disaster or emergency:



### Make a Family Plan that includes your pets!

Many people treat their pets as 'family'. Because our pets depend on us, it is important that we remember their safety needs during a disaster or emergency, as we prepare ourselves and our families. If we have a plan on how we can take care of our pets during an emergency, we can increase the safety and reaction time for our whole family.

#### A Family Plan can include:

- Having a list of emergency contact numbers (friends, relatives, etc.) posted to review with each family member.
- · Deciding where to meet if a disaster strikes.
- Knowing safe places inside of your home to stay if you are required to 'shelter-in'.
- Having a plan for your pets: Most shelters do not allow animals.



Our pets depend on us. Always include your pets in your family plan—do not leave them at home alone during an emergency or evacuation.

- Flooding could cause your pets to drown if left alone.
- Structural damage to your home could cause your pet severe harm, or your pet could escape and become lost.
- Evacuation may cause you to be away from your home for days or even weeks at a time.






# Prepare an Evacuation Kit for your Pet

During an emergency, time is precious!

Have a ready-to-go evacuation kit with pet supplies such as food, water, portable bowls, a leash/harness/carrier and any special medications needed prepared ahead of time.

The kit should be easy to transport and kept in an accessible spot such as the trunk of your car or near an exit in your home.





#### **Stay Informed**

On Long Island, natural threats such as hurricanes, winter storms, and flooding can strike unexpectedly. While it is impossible to determine when a natural or manmade disaster will arise, having a plan for and knowledge about each situation can be the key to your family's safety.

- If possible, stay tuned to your local television or radio stations for official news and instructions as information becomes available.
- Some parts of the South Shore are barely above sea-level: Find out if you live in a 'flood zone' and where the nearest evacuation routes in your area are.
- If you own livestock, farm animals, or have pets with other special needs, be aware of the additional preparation and planning that is necessary in transporting, relocating, or sheltering your animal(s) during an emergency.
